NCHSAA Endowment Fund

The Endowment has directly benefited the NCHSAA, its member schools and numerous student athletes in a variety of ways.

The NCHSAA Endowed Funds were established respectively, in 1991 and 1996. The General Endowment's stated purpose at inception in 1991 was to preserve and create opportunities for student-athletes statewide participating in athletic programs at NCHSAA member high schools and to allow the Association to maintain quality programs and services for its member high schools.

The Hall of Fame Fund was established in 1996 to preserve, recognize and honor school administrators who have given years of time, experience, passion for sports, and mentoring of young athletes. Recognition is given at an annual Hall of Fame Banquet in the spring as well as special recognition at a collegiate football game in the fall.

NCHSAA Endowed funds exist through contributions from individuals, businesses and other private sources. Contributions are invested and a portion of the interest income generated from these investments is available for use as designated and approved by the NCHSAA Board of Directors.

In all, almost \$3 Million has been utilized since 1994 for distribution of funds to member schools, offsetting costs of Olympic playoff events and special events, student scholarships, an AED Placement Project and other uses approved by the Board of Directors

The NCHSAA Board of Directors revised policies related to distribution of money several years ago to distribute additional funds to the membership, including a percentage of the income interest earned from the General Endowed Fund (60% in 2014-15) and a percentage of the one-dollar surcharge revenues on playoff tickets (35% in 2014-15). This has resulted, since 2011-12, in more than \$1.7 million distributed directly to NCHSAA member schools for their use



in the past several years.

In addition, schools have been allowed to play an extra game, known as an Endowment Game, since 1993 in any revenue-producing sport with 25% of the money from those games restricted to the general Endowed Fund. Schools have greatly benefited through their participation and have shared in over \$9 million dollars!

Willie Bradshaw Memorial Endowed Scholarship

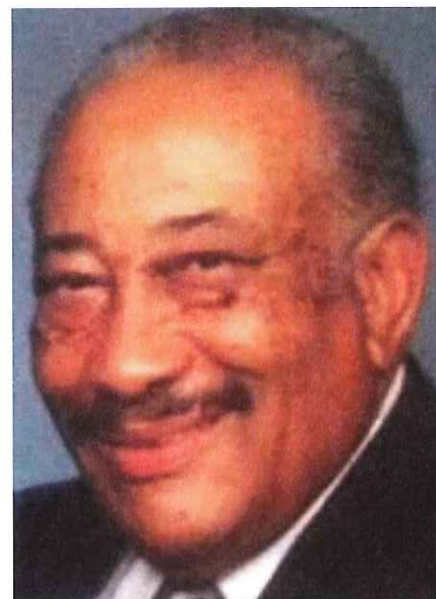
The Willie Bradshaw Memorial Endowed Scholarship, formerly known as the North Carolina High School Athletic Association Student Endowed Scholarship, has launched with the 2015-2016 school year. Following approval by the NCHSAA Board of Directors and the Bradshaw family, the Association is honored to offer the Willie Bradshaw Memorial Endowed Scholarship on behalf of a man who gave so much to athletics at the state and national level.

A native of Durham, North Carolina, Willie Bradshaw devoted a lifetime of service to his city and his alma mater but was recognized nationally. He was an outstanding athlete at Hillside High School in Durham and played on the 1943 football team which was unbeaten, untied, and unscored upon. He graduated in 1945 and continued his education at North Carolina College, now known as North Carolina Central University. Willie was a great athlete at NCCU and was inducted into the NCCU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1985. He also pitched professionally for several years with the Negro League teams.

Willie coached at I.E. Johnson in Laurinburg, at Lincoln High in Chapel Hill, and then at Dudley High School in Greensboro before assuming the athletic director and coach position at Hillside in 1963. He served Hillside High School for 15 years and then became the first African-american, city/county athletic director for the Durham City School system where he remained until retiring in 1992.

A former president of both the North Carolina High School Athletic Directors Association as well as the North Carolina Coaches Association, Willie Bradshaw's career coaching mark as a head football coach was 96-43-6 while his basketball coaching record was 215-119 over 14 seasons.

Willie was honored with a North Carolina High School Athletic Association Distinguished Service Award in 1992 and was also involved at the national level with the National

Interscholastic Athletic Administrators' Association and the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS). He was inducted into the NCHSAA Hall of Fame in 1995 and the National High School Hall of Fame in 2010.

This scholarship is made possible by private donations to the NCHSAA Scholarship Endowed Fund and in part by a former 3-year pledge from former corporate partner, AAA of the Carolinas.

Last year marked the first year of the NCHSAA Commissioner's Cup program, powered by Time Warner Cable SportsChannel. In April of 2015, the NCHSAA announced the recipients in the 2014-15 competition and recognized them at the May 7, 2015 Annual Meeting in Chapel Hill.

The Commissioner's Cup seeks to recognize athletic teams or cheerleading squads at NCHSAA member schools based on their respective community service efforts.

Two schools from each classification are awarded annually and each receives a \$1,000 stipend for their respective team or school athletic program.

The 2014-15 recipients included Pender and Swain County from the 1A classification; Mount Pleasant and Monroe Parkwood from the 2A classification; North Henderson and Southern Durham from 3A class; and Charlotte Catholic and Garner Magnet High School of the 4A classified schools.

McGee Scholarship Winners Announced For NCHSAA, NCADA

CHAPEL HILL—Cameryn Smith of West Brunswick High School and Dalton Edwards of West Iredell High School were the winners of the annual Jerry McGee Endowed Scholarships awarded this past year by the North Carolina High School Athletic Association.

The two outstanding student-athletes were recognized during the 2015 North Carolina Coaches Association clinic in Greensboro, during the North Carolina Athletic Directors Association (NCADA) Leadership Academy held as part of the clinic week.

The scholarships are made possible through the generosity of donors to the fund, in honor of the long-time NCADA executive director, Jerry McGee. McGee is a member of both the North Carolina High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame and the National High School Sports Hall of Fame. Each recipient receives a \$1,000 scholarship to further his or her education at the college level.

Awarded to two senior year high school student-athletes from NCHSAA member schools each year, this award is unique because it honors both male and female student-athletes who have distinguished themselves by overcoming adversity and returned to excel beyond expectations in their scholastic sport. The NCADA Awards Committee selects recipients with approval by the NCADA Executive Board.

Smith was a women's golf performer at West Brunswick who served as team captain one year and finished in the individual top 10 twice in four years of qualifying for the North Carolina High School Athletic Association state tournament. The first player from her school to qualify for the state event, she also earned conference Player of the Year honors as a junior.

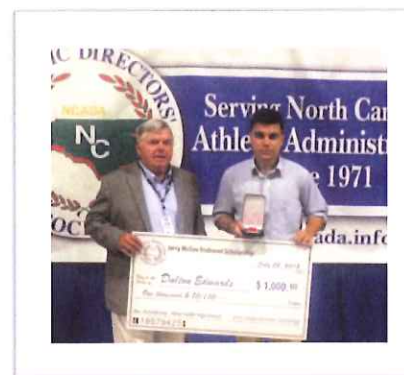

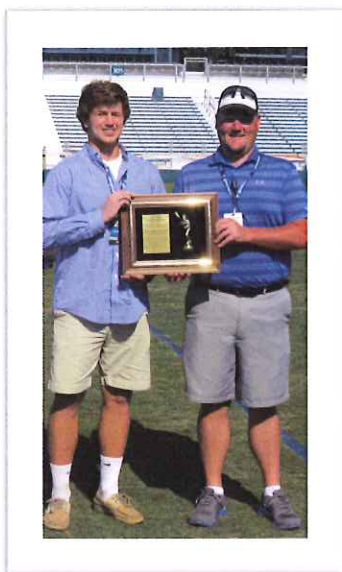

Sixth Annual Adams Scholarship Winners Announced

Elvie Sumner of Hobbton High School and Joseph Meyers of Holly Springs High School were named winners of the sixth annual Charles Adams Endowed Scholarships awarded by the North Carolina High School Athletic Association at the May 2015 Annual Meeting at the Dean E. Smith Center on the campus of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

The scholarships are made possible through the generosity of donors to the fund in honor of the long-time, former NCHSAA executive director, Charlie Adams, who retired in 2010 after 42 years with the organization. He was inducted into the NCHSAA Hall of Fame in 2009, is a member of the National High School Sports Hall of Fame, and is also the only North Carolinian ever to serve as president of the National Federation of State High School Associations.

Sumner participated in cross country, indoor track, and outdoor track and field during her career at Hobbton, but her story actually starts in Latvia where she was born and lived in an orphanage before being adopted by a family in the United States. Elvie served as captain of the cross country team and made all-conference. The Hobbton student was a Junior Marshal and a member of the Beta Club, taking a variety of Advanced Placement and honors classes. She is continuing her education at Appalachian State University and is interested in architecture.

Meyers was an outstanding wrestler who lettered three years in the sport at Holly Springs and was captain of last year's squad. He took first place in the Eagle Invitational in the 126-pound class.

The Holly Springs student-athlete qualified for the "A" Honor Roll for four years, was a member of the National Honor Society and a Junior Marshal. He is the founder and president of the "History of Gaming" club at Holly Springs and served as a student ambassador for a trip to China in 2012. Joseph was also a member of the Tri-M Music Honor Society and a member of Colla Voce, the school's advanced choral ensemble. He is attending North Carolina State University and the College of Engineering at NCSU.

One annual scholarship award recognizes a male wrestler in memory of Charlie and Sue's son Scott and one goes to a female cross-country runner in honor of Charlie's daughter Michelle Adams Szwajkun. Each recipient receives a \$1,500 scholarship to further his or her education at the college level.

Natalie Tribble, Scott Braswell Named Toby Webb Award Winners

Natalie Tribble of North Iredell High School and Scott Braswell of Hoggard High School in Wilmington were the recipients of the 10th annual Toby Webb Coach of the Year Awards given by the North Carolina High School Athletic Association at the NCHSAA's 2015 Annual Meeting held at the Smith Center on the campus of the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill.

The Webb Award is made possible through the generosity of gifts from individuals and companies through the NCHSAA Endowment and annually recognizes an outstanding male and female coach. To be eligible for the award, a coach must be nominated by school personnel at the NCHSAA member school where he or she coaches, must have coached for a minimum of 10 years, and made major contributions to the success of high school athletics at the school, in the community, and beyond.

Tribble has completed 14 years as a head coach at North Iredell High School, transforming a program that had a long drought of conference titles and state playoff appearances into a perennial contender and one that draws excellent crowds. The North Iredell team won the 2008 NCHSAA state 3-A championship, posting a perfect 26-0 record, and finished as runner-up in both 2010 and '11, with Tribble earning six North Piedmont Conference Coach of the Year honors over the past 15 years. In 2014, the Raiders were 21-4 and advanced to the third round of the state playoffs.

Coach Tribble is known for setting high standards both on and off the court for her players, but is also very much a players' coach. Many of her former players weighed in on the impact Coach Tribble had on them as they wrote letters of support for the 2015 Webb Award, citing how the lessons they learned playing volleyball had helped them in so many ways. Tribble also helped the team get involved in service projects, such as Relay for Life and Dig Pink, and during the holidays, the team has sung Christmas carols in nursing homes and hospitals. Last year the team packed shoeboxes for Samaritan's Purse.

Scott Braswell has served as the head football coach at Hoggard since 1997 and guided what has become one of the state's top programs under his leadership. Hoggard won the NCHSAA state 4-A championship in 2007 and went 13-1 last fall, losing in the Eastern finals to eventual state champion, New Bern. He has earned the Mideastern Conference Coach of the Year honor 11 times and has posted an excellent 168-51 mark as a head coach. In 2013, the stadium at Hoggard was named Scott Braswell Stadium in his honor.

The Hoggard coach is very supportive of other teams at the school, even driving the bus to away games for other programs. He is active in his church and in the Wilmington community with such organizations as Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Habitat for Humanity. In fact, he was named "Inspiration Hero to Kids" by the Wilmington Children's Museum last year. Braswell also has shown remarkable tenacity as he battled health issues. He had surgery at the Mayo Clinic in August 2014 to remove a rare mass on his spine with the operation taking 25 hours over a two-day period. Despite the intrusive surgery, Scott was back on the sidelines just five weeks later with one of his players noting that "Coach has the dedication that even cancer couldn't deter."

"Natalie and Scott are dedicated professionals who epitomize in many ways the role of coaches and the far-reaching impact they have," said former NCHSAA commissioner Davis Whitfield. "They are most deserving of this recognition and receiving the prestigious Toby Webb Award is a credit to their service and dedication to young people."

The awards are given annually in honor of Toby Webb, a member of the NCHSAA Hall of Fame who was an outstanding coach as well as a principal and superintendent. He helped turn Albemarle into a football power and posted a brilliant 103-18-6 mark as a head coach there.
