Dear Que:

This letter is a follow-up to our conversations regarding national championships and national events.

To give you an historical overview, over the years the NFHS has frequently considered the issue of high school national championships. To expand upon that, below in boldfaced copy are some selected passages from the NFHS Handbook that address that:

The earliest recorded action took place on February 26, 1934, when the National Council voted that the Executive Committee should refuse to sanction any meet or tournament which is in the nature of a contest to determine a national high school championship.

The policy concerning sanctioning national championships has been under constant review by the NFHS and was reaffirmed July 9, 1977, when the National Council in amending the Athletic Bylaws adopted the following: "Sanction shall not be granted for any tournament, meet or other contest to qualify for and/or determine a national high school championship."

However, at its July 1977 meeting in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the NFHS Competition Committee recommended the topic of national championships sponsored and conducted by the NFHS be discussed at every NFHS Section Meeting during 1977-78. These discussions did occur.

A RESOLUTION authorizing the NFHS to develop a comprehensive promotional program for high school activities, including sponsorship of national championships, was passed 24 to 18 by the National Council on January 1, 1978, with the provision that the program be submitted for the review of the National Council in July 1978. A plan for national competition in golf, tennis, and track and field, beginning in 1979, was developed by the Executive Committee (Board of Directors) and distributed to the membership in February

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City on July 7, 1978, the National Council voted 27 to 17 to delay for one year taking action on the Executive Committee's plan. It was the expressed hope of the National Council delegates who voted for the delay that during the 1978-79 school year the NFHS would obtain commitments from both principals and school boards at the local as well as state and national levels to either join the NFHS in attempting to halt the proliferation of nonschool-sponsored national competition or support the NFHS' efforts to provide healthier, school-sponsored national competition.

A VOTE on the plan to conduct national invitational competitions in golf, tennis, and track and field during the summer was taken by the National Council on July 7, 1979, in Cambridge, Massachusetts. The Council, by a 38 to 9 vote, declined to approve the plan. In the ensuing decades, the membership has revisited periodically the subject of national championships. In the absence of a coalescence of membership support, the NFHS has not conducted or endorsed such events. On January 4, 2011, in Savannah, Georgia, the National Council defeated a proposed amendment to the NFHS Bylaws by a vote of 29 to 22 (must have a 2/3 majority to amend the Bylaws) that would have allowed the NFHS to conduct national championships in golf and cross country.

POSITION STATEMENT ON NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS:

The NFHS does not support, nor sanction, national school team competition that leads to a champion that may be perceived by the media and others to be a national champion in an athletic event.

The NFHS recognizes that entrepreneurs, for-profit corporations, and others may choose to invite schools and/or individual athletes to participate in competition which may include representatives from a number of different states. Whether or not the NFHS sanctioning policy may apply to such events, the NFHS suggests that invited schools and athletes exercise due diligence before choosing to participate.

The NFHS endorses and supports tournaments promulgated by member state associations which provide a culminating activity for student-athletes in sports sponsored by individual state high school athletic and activity associations.

Having provided that history, the NFHS continues not to sanction such events. However, it should also be noted that there is no penalty to those states that do participate in such events.

Finally, as you are aware as a member of the NFHS Strategic Planning Committee that met in Indianapolis in January of this year, the NFHS Strategic Plan has inserted this topic for further

discussion by the membership. In addition, we have had states participate in such events during the past decade and have spoken favorably of the experience.

I hope this is helpful to you. Please let me know if you have any questions or needs regarding this issue as you continue discussions in your state.

Dear Mr. McCullough

This letter is sent on behalf of the North Carolina High School Athletic Association (NCHSAA), NCHSAA Board of Directors and Que Tucker, Commissioner of the NCHSAA.

During the NCHSAA 3-A Basketball Championships, held on March 12, 2016, at Carmichael Arena in Chapel Hill, NC, you engaged in misconduct inconsistent with a wholesome athletic program. Your actions were inappropriate and reprehensible. In accordance with NCHSAA's Penalty Code (Rule 3.2.1(d)), and given the nature and severity of your actions, you are hereby prohibited from attending and entering the premises of any NCHSAA contest for a period of one year from the date of the offense, March 12, 2016. NCHSAA contests shall include any athletic contests sanctioned by the NCHSAA, including but not limited to NCHSAA Championships, wherever located.

To be clear, this letter is to serve as formal notice that, effective today, you may not enter or remain on the property of any facility, arena or other real property where a NCHSAA contest is being held, wherever located, for a period of one year. Failure to comply with the directives contained in this letter may result in the appropriate criminal charges being filed with law enforcement.

A copy of this notice has been forwarded to the UNC Department of Public Safety and Orange County Sheriff's Department. NCHSAA member schools will be advised of your banishment from NCHSAA contests. Please be aware, additional law enforcement agencies may be notified of this letter as NCHSAA contests are scheduled and held.

Subject: Incident at NCHSAA 3A Basketball Championship

Date: April 18, 2016

The winter sports' season of the NCHSAA ended just over a month ago. As you may be aware, a spectator entered the basketball court at the end of the NCHSAA 3-A basketball championship game held on March 12, 2016, at Carmichael Arena in Chapel Hill, NC, and struck a NCHSAA student-athlete in the face. The security staff at Carmichael Arena responded quickly, preventing any further risk to student-athletes, coaches and spectators. For that, we are grateful!

The NCHSAA will continue to cooperate with law enforcement should they require our assistance regarding the investigation of this incident. All parties involved on that night were made aware of the punitive action taken by the NCHSAA against the spectator should they seek to take action or impose additional sanctions against the individual.

The behavior exhibited by the spectator is neither one the NCHSAA condones nor tolerates. The NCHSAA is committed to protecting the health, safety and well being of its student athletes and will continue to develop methods and strategies to prevent unfortunate incidents like this from occurring in the future.

Please note that the NCHSAA, in accordance with its handbook and penalty code, has banned the spectator from all NCHSAA events for a period of one year. At its spring meeting, the NCHSAA Board of Directors will revisit the penalties imposed, as well as examine the NCHSAA penalty code for such behavior to ensure adherence to association principles and core values.

In reflecting on this incident, the NCHSAA wants to remind each member school of its obligation to encourage positive behavior while serving as a role model of good sportsmanship. Students are our priority, and because good sportsmanship is one of the core values of the NCHSAA, we are totally committed to ensuring that this core value is known, understood and practiced.
