



2023 North Carolina High School Athletic Association Men's Soccer Championship Game Notes



CHAPEL HILL -- The North Carolina High School Athletic Association is proud to stage the 2023 Men's Soccer Championship matches at MacPherson Stadium in the Truist Soccer Complex in Browns Summit. This year marks the second year in a row that the championship matches have been contested at MacPherson Stadium but 2022 was the first time that the men's soccer championships were held in the Greensboro area since leaving high school sites in 1992.

The 2023 Championship Matches will begin on Friday, Nov. 17 at 7:00 p.m. with the 4A Championship between the No. 15 Seed in the East Apex Friendship and the No. 24 Seed in the West South Mecklenburg. On Saturday, the 3A Championship will start the day at 11:00 a.m. as the both No. 1 Seeds, First Flight in the East and Hickory in the West will face off. The 1A Championship is set to begin at 2:30 p.m. as East No. 1 Seed Hobbton takes on West No. 3 Seed Gray Stone Day. The final match of the day will be the 2A Championship between No. 2 Seed in the East Franklin Academy and West No. 2 Seed Community School of Davidson.

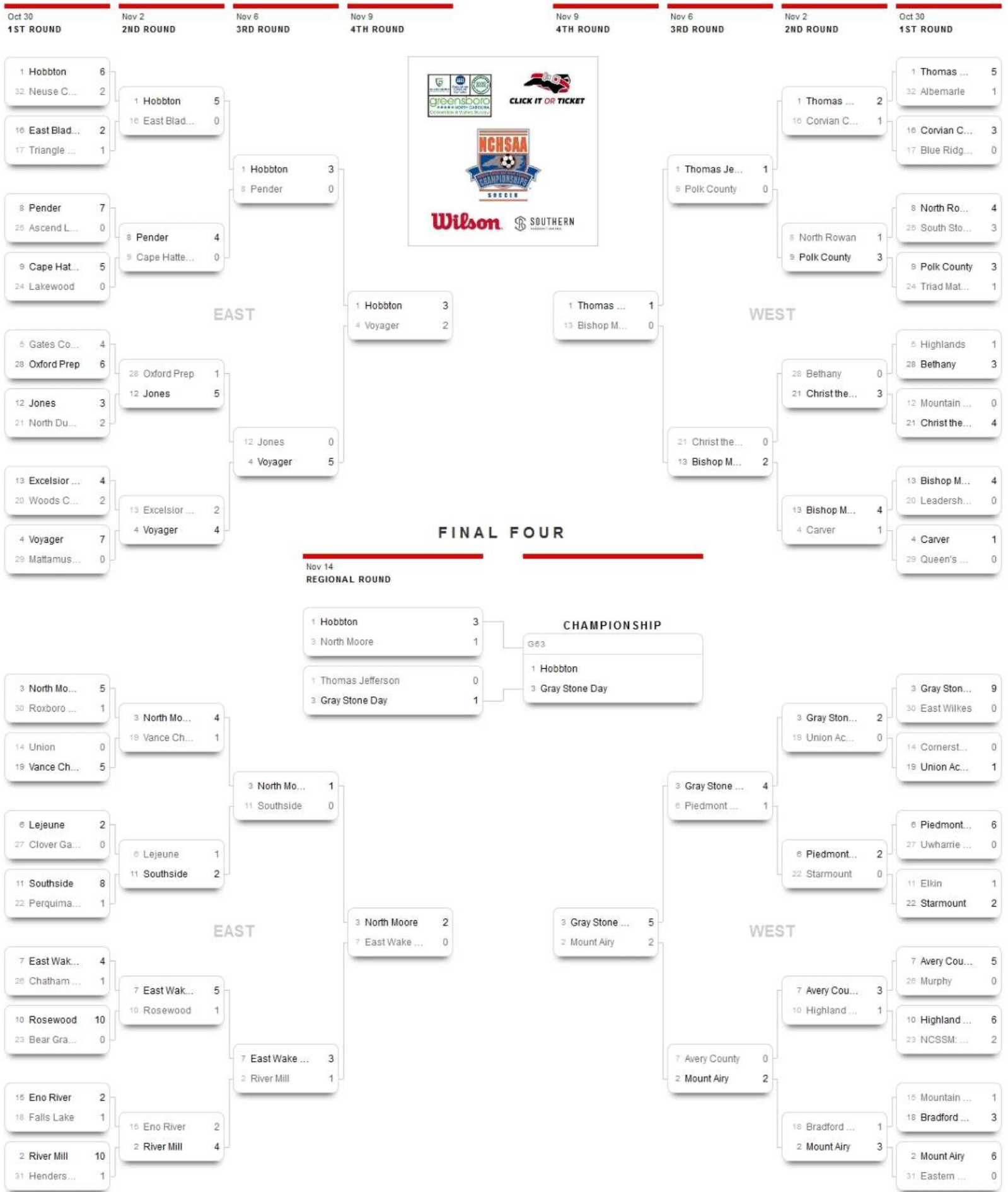

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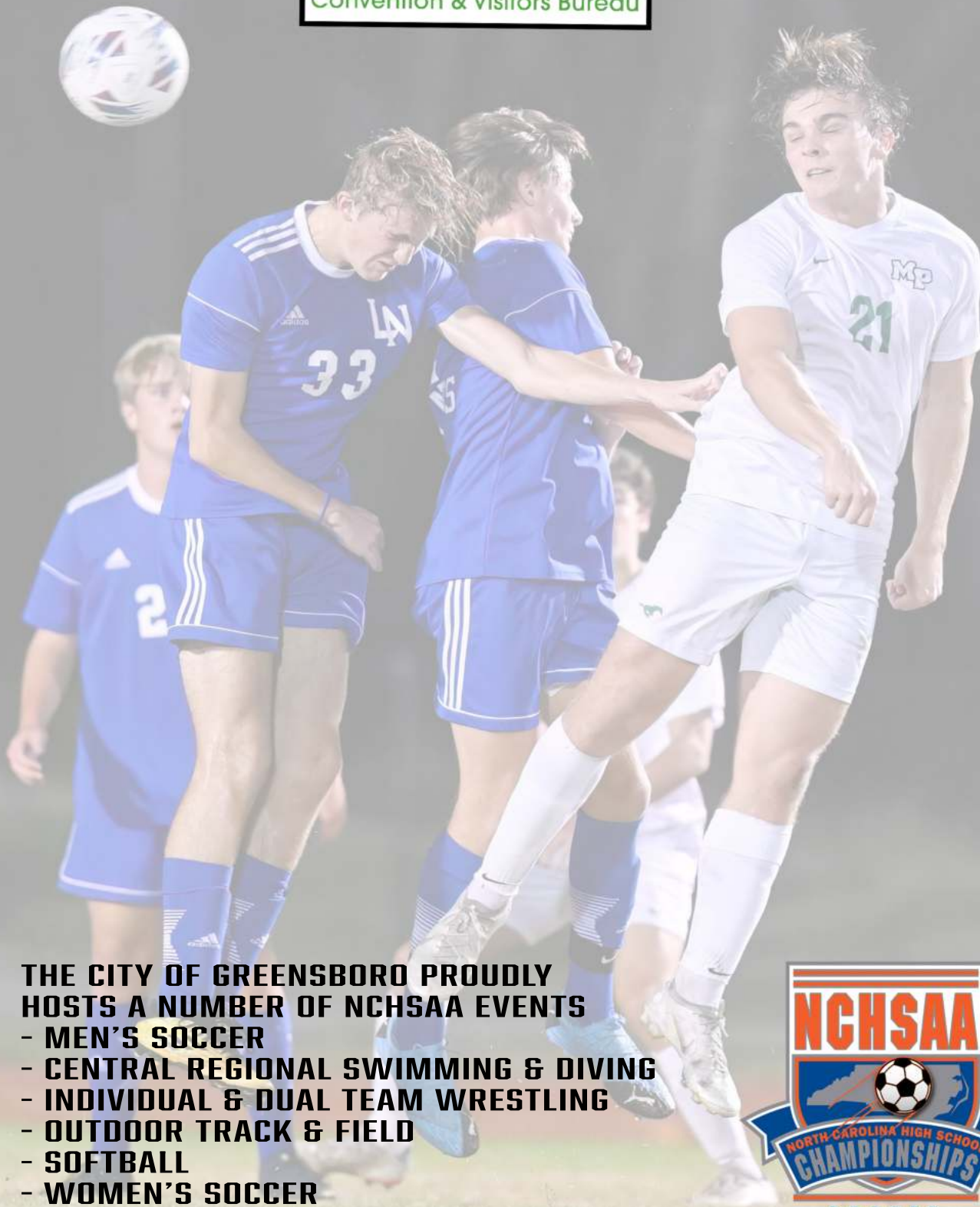

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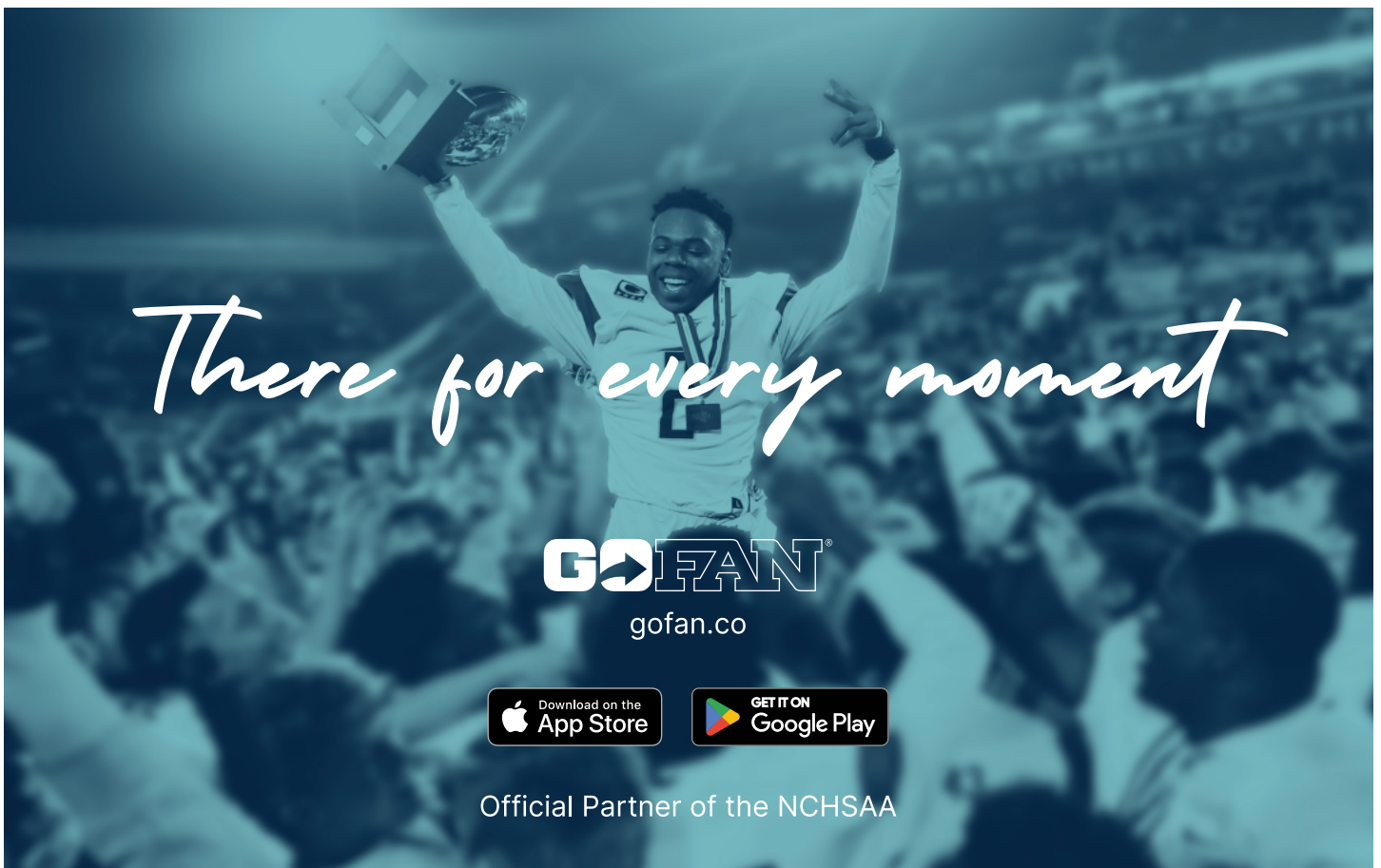

2022 4A Men's Soccer Championship Recap | Gibbons holds off Weddington 1-0 to win second title in three years

BROWNS SUMMIT, NC – Cardinal Gibbons managed to hold off a tough challenge from Weddington to win the 4A State Championship 1-0. Joseph Abdenour tallied the lone goal of the game and dominated the midfield throughout the contest on his way to being selected as the 4A Men's Soccer Most Valuable Player.

Gibbons struck in the 59th minute of the game, breaking a scoreless draw, as a Carlos Lomena shot from just outside the box was deflected across the front of the net to the edge of the penalty area where Abdenour collected it and rifled the ball off the crossbar and just beyond the goal line to make it 1-0.

Weddington had their best opportunity of the game in the 79th minute off of a corner kick that was sent in by Tucker Kern high to the back post from the corner. Jake Wittig got his head to the ball sending a nearly perfect header onto the crossbar and straight down into the fray in the six-yard box, right behind Crusader goalkeeper Paddy Eagan. Flailing on the ground, Eagan managed to secure the loose ball before one of three Warriors could pounce on it and stuff it into the back of the net to tie the game.

Gibbons certainly had the run of play for the majority of the night. The Crusaders outshot Weddington 22-8 in the game, putting eight of those shots on frame. Weddington only managed three shots on frame, which Eagan saved all three, but their most dangerous chance, Wittig's header in the 79th minute, does not count as a shot on goal since it hit the crossbar and went out.

Weddington finished the season 21-3-1. The Warriors were the champions of the Southern Carolina 4A and appeared in the program's first 4A State Championship. The Warriors won the Men's Soccer team's third Western Regional Championship and appeared in the State Championship Match for the first time since winning the 2020-21 COVID-shortened season.

Cardinal Gibbons wrapped the year 17-5-3, the Crusaders were 6-2-2 in Cap Six 4A play. The Crusaders won the program's eighth Men's Soccer State Championship and 10th Regional Championship, dating back to their first State Championship Appearance in the 2A Championship Match in 2005.

2022 3A Men's Soccer Championship Recap | Hickory edges Jacksonville 2-1 for first title since 2000

BROWNS SUMMIT, NC – A scoreless first half gave way to a fiery second half that saw the Hickory Red Tornadoes claim a 2-1 victory over Jacksonville and the 3A Men's Soccer State Championship. Freshman center back Braeden McCourt cleared a would-be Jacksonville go-ahead goal off the Tornado line before netting a go-ahead goal of his own on the way to winning the 3A Championship's Most Valuable Player Award.

McCourt's first heroics came with the score knotted at zero when Jacksonville forward, Jack Leary came screaming through the Tornado defense and worked his way around Hickory goalkeeper Conner Mejia. Leary flicked a ball towards an open net, but McCourt managed to clear it just before it crossed the line, knocking it out for a corner kick in the 50th minute. Just eight minutes later, Hickory had a free kick opportunity that pinballed in the box and fell to McCourt just to the left of the Cardinals' goal. McCourt made no mistake pounding it home to lift Hickory to the 1-0 lead.

Just three minutes later, Hickory added another goal, what turned out to be the game-winner, off a free kick at the left edge of the penalty area. Josue Leal curled a right-footed boot around the Cardinal wall, two-hopping the right side netting to put the Tornadoes in front 2-0 with 20 minutes to play.

Jacksonville certainly did not back down after giving up the goal. The Cardinals drew within a goal as Tyler Gregory poked a loose ball in the box home off a deflection in the six-yard box. The goal in the 74th minute gave Jacksonville extra life, and the Cardinals poured on the pressure. Earning a free kick at the edge of the penalty area from straightaway. Leary curled a shot off the right post, which deflected off Mathias Navar and had to be saved by Mejia to maintain a 2-1 lead.

Jacksonville finished the season 18-8-2. The Cardinals were the Champions of the Big Carolina 3A/4A with a record of 10-1 in conference play. The Cardinals won the program's sixth Eastern Regional Championship, appearing in the State Championship for the first time since 2013.

Rosewood put up a galliant fight, particularly in the first few minutes. The Crusaders broke through early though, seven minutes in Marcos Frias found himself with some space on the right flank, sliding a ball through the edge of the box to the middle of the field finding Drew Hansen. It was fitting for Bacchus to take the penalty after drawing the foul, his speed proved a threat throughout the night, forcing Hickory defenders to collapse to him and opening lanes for other Warrior attackers. The goal was Bacchus' 22nd goal of the season and cemented his selection as 3A State Championship Game Most Valuable Player.

Hickory managed 12 shots in the game, but only one of them got through the Warrior defense on frame, forcing Warrior goalkeeper Spencer Dee to make his only save of the night. Orlando Almanza headed the ball towards the frame on a loose ball in the edge of the Warrior penalty area, requiring the save from Dee.

Hickory wrapped up their season 22-4-1. The Red Tornadoes were 11-2-1 as the champions of the Western Foothills 3A conference. Hickory won the program's fifth NCHSAA Regional Championship, appearing in the State Championship Match for the first time since 2012.

Western Alamance completed the year 19-5-1. The Warriors finished conference play 9-2-1 in the Central 3A. The Warriors reached the State Championship as the #21 seed in the 3A East, reaching the state final for just the second time in school history and the first time since their initial appearance in the 2A finals in 1997.

CARY, NC – New Hanover sped past Hough 3-0 in the 4A State Championship Match, winning the Wildcats' first State Championship in program history. The Wildcats opened on the attack outshooting Hough 14-3, with 10 of those 14 on frame, in the opening half on their way to a dominating win.

Aidan Payne was selected as the match's MVP with two goals and an assist in the game. He constantly caused problems for the Hough defense with his pace and skilled footwork, creating space and finding holes in the finishing third of the field.

The Wildcats opened the scoring early as Payne found Charlie Letson on a cross through the box. Letson let loose a blast off his right foot into the low left portion of the goal to give New Hanover a 1-0 lead in the 8th minute. In the 26th minute, Payne opened his account as a deflected ball in the Hough defense fell to his right foot and he made no mistake with the finish to go up 2-0.

To cap off the night, Payne netted his 54th goal of the season as Andy McCague dropped a high ball into the box leading Payne to a wide open right footed finish. Payne's marker in the 60th minute closed out the scoring and allowed the Wildcats to relax a bit into a more defensive posture, though Payne did threaten a few more chances vying for a hat trick.

Hough finished the season 22-4-1. The Huskies were 11-1 and champions of the Queen City 3A/4A Conference. The Huskies won their second Western Regional Final appearing in the State Championship for the first time since 2017.

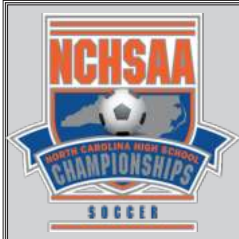

CARY, NC – Pine Lake Prep secured their first Men's Soccer State Championship knocking off Franklin Academy 3-1 in an overtime thriller, delayed some two and a half hours by inclement weather. Pine Lake Prep's Jayden Deku provided the game's opening goal, getting another to break the 1-1 tie in overtime, on his way to being named the game's Most Valuable Player.

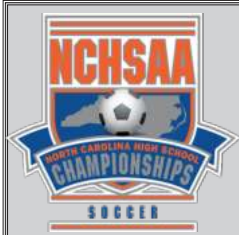

Croatan nets three in OT to down Hibriten 4-1, wins first State Championship

CARY, NC – The Croatan Cougars and Hibriten Panthers played even for 80 minutes, but it was the Cougars that exploded for three goals in overtime to take the 2A Men's Soccer State Championship 4-1, winning the program's first State Championship.

The match started with early fireworks, both teams netting goals in the sixth minute. Croatan opened the scoring as match Most Valuable Player, Travis Garner-McGraw, finished a through ball into the box from Gavin Beaupre to put the Cougars up 1-0. Hibriten responded immediately as David Franquiz worked his way into the left side of the 18-yard box off the restart, slotting a shot past the keeper to the far post to equalize 1-1.

Neither team could break the tie for regulation, though Croatan had arguably the best opportunity, ripping a shot from just outside the box off the crossbar and down back into the penalty area.

In the extra periods, Croatan scored early and often. Alex Amato sent a perfectly weighted ball into the left side of the box for Beaupre, who brought the ball down seamlessly and chipped it past the keeper on the near post to put the Cougars ahead for good, 2-1 in the 83'. Beaupre finished the night with a goal and an assist.

Croatan's Danny Metcalf put the game on ice in the 85', dribbling through a pair of Panther defenders and finding himself with time about 25 yards out. He lasered a shot with his right foot, low, and into the left corner of the goal to put the Cougars up 3-1. Metcalf added an assist in the second overtime period, sending in a corner kick for the head of Garner-McGraw, who knocked it home to finish the scoring in the 92'.

Hibriten finished the season 18-1-0; the Panthers were 14-0-0 in the Northwestern Foothills 2A, where they won the conference title. The program made its second appearance in an NCHSAA Men's Soccer State Title game, winning the Western Regional Championship for the first time since 1989.

Croatan concluded the year 18-0-0, a perfect 11-0-0 in Coastal 8 1A/2A conference play, winning the league championship. The Cougars appeared in the State Championship Game for the first time in program history after winning the Eastern Regional Championship for the first time.

Cardinal Gibbons held the ball well for the first half, frustrating a high-powered Myers Park attack that was not able to generate more than a handful of quality scoring opportunities.

Some shaky moments defending in the box three minutes later by CSD allowed Noah Wells to pick up a loose ball in the box on the goal line and his shot was handled by the keeper.

Then Scarantino chased down a long diagonal ball into the box in the 63rd minute, ripping the one-timer over the bar. Just three minutes later, Scarantino found himself on the end of a beautiful cross into the box by Mason Kosik. Kosik had deflected a clearance to himself, springing him into the clear with an opportunity to find Scarantino on the right side. Scarantino made no mistake, volleying the shot into net with his right boot tying the score at 1.

Community School of Davidson had several opportunities in the first overtime, particularly off of set pieces. In the 84th minute a corner kick dropped on the head of Haddock who pushed the shot wide. The best opportunity came when the Spartans won a free kick in the 98th minute 25 yards from goal. Haddock pounced the shot, dipping under the bar, but McGhinnis sprawled up to poke the ball high and over the bar, and out for another corner.

McGhinnis saved a header off the line on a corner opportunity in the sudden-victory overtime. Three minutes later, the keeper stood tall again poking a corner out and starting a counter attack for Voyager. Kosik launched a ball just outside the right edge of the Spartan box, and Scarantino ran onto the ball just ahead of the keeper, flicking it over his outstretched arms and into the net for the win. Scarantino was named the match Most Valuable Player for his pair of goals, including the game-winner.

Community School of Davidson finished the season 22-2-2, they were 14-0 as the champions of the PAC 7 1A. The Spartans reached the State Championship for the second time in school history.

Voyager Academy wrapped up the year 22-3-2, they were the champions of the North Central Athletic 1A Conference at 14-0. The Vikings won the schools first state championship in men's soccer in their first championship appearance.

2A Championship: Clinton Dark Horses come from behind to down Newton-Conover and win first title

RALEIGH, NC – In the school's first State Championship appearance in Men's Soccer, the Clinton Dark Horses looked smooth and calm, despite falling behind in the second half against the defending 2A State Champions from Newton-Conover.

Clinton had the better of the possession in the first half, and had the first real scoring opportunity of the day when Jared Aguilar got in on the keeper one-on-one, but it was parried away in the 20th minute. Aguilar again got loose behind the Red Devil's defense two minutes later, earning a corner kick which was headed just wide of the target.

After a scoreless first half, it was Newton-Conover that got on the board first. Dribbling along well outside the box on the left side, Jason Agreda stunned everyone when he turned loose a shot that skimmed low along the ground, finding the right side of the net in the 43rd minute to give the Red Devils a 1-0 lead.

After springing Aguilar on the first two Clinton opportunities and seeing his team fall behind, Parker Norris went to work for the Dark Horses. Clinton played a ball into the right side of the box and Peter Darden chipped it over the keeper, clanging it off the bar where it fell to the waiting Norris who pounded it into the net to tie the score at 1 with 22:58 to go.

Just over five minutes later, the Dark Horses earned a corner kick, one of their eight in the match, and Reid Taylor bent an out-swinging ball right onto the waiting right foot of Norris who promptly deposited it into the bottom right corner of the net through traffic to lift Clinton to a 2-1 lead in the 63rd minute. Norris was named the game's MVP with the two goals.

Newton-Conover finished the season at 22-4-1, they were 12-1-1 in the South Fork 2A where they were the conference champions. The Red Devils appeared in the State Championship for the fourth time in school history and the second consecutive year.

Clinton wrapped up their campaign at 26-1-0 on the year, 11-1 in the East Central 2A where they were the Champions. The Dark Horses advanced to the State Championship for the first time with a 0-0 (4-2 PK) decision over the defending 2A Eastern Regional Champions from First Flight. Clinton won the school's first men's soccer State Championship.

3A Championship: Chapel Hill goes back-to-back with a 1-0 win over Marvin Ridge

RALEIGH, NC – Chapel Hill won the school's second straight State Championship in Men's Soccer as they held off Marvin Ridge in a tightly contested match 1-0, winning the 3A Championship.

Chapel Hill outshot the Mavericks 6-3 on the day, but Marvin Ridge had the first big chance as Nick Jones sent a cross in along the ground all the way through the goal mouth in the 14th minute. That send Chapel Hill defenders scrambling in the box, eventually clearing the ball to safety. Two minutes later the Tigers, who held the majority of possession in the first half, sent a high, curling ball into the box that was ripped down by the keeper just in front of a Tiger attacker, keeping the game scoreless.

In the 20th minute, the Chapel Hill pressure paid off for the Tigers as a high cross came into the box, knocking off of three or four players before finding the head of Kalvin Matishack. Matishack coolly deposited the ball in the back of the net to lift the Tigers into the lead, 1-0, a lead they would never relinquish, as they moved on to the fifth state Championship in school history.

Matishack was the second straight defender to win the 3A Most Valuable Player honors, joining teammate Ryan Smith who won the honor a year ago. The Center Back played a critical role all afternoon, shutting down attacks in the center of the park by the Mavericks and of course had the game winning goal.

The Tigers had two more first half opportunities to put the match away, as a corner pinballed around the box in the 32nd minute, eventually dropping to the right foot of Tom Morioka who blistered a shot off the keeper and out of play. Six minutes later Morioka again played a huge role in setting up an attack, getting to the goal line and sliding a cross through the box all the way across goal to Gabo Tobin-Xet who pounded the ball off the crossbar and out.

Chapel Hill continued the pressure in the second half as Cobi Promislow had two shots on frame, knocking it off the keeper both times in the 44th minute. Marvin Ridge began to gain their footing in the 53rd minute when Jones volleyed a beautiful cross from Zenou Tchamwa. The shot skimmed low and along the ground right on, swallowed by the keeper as the score remained 1-0. The Tigers had the final good opportunity as Morioka headed one right and saved off the line from a cross sent in by Tobin-Xet.

Marvin Ridge wrapped up the season 21-4, 12-2 in the Southern Carolina 3A where they were second. The Mavericks made their fourth Championship appearance and their first since 2016.

Chapel Hill finished the season 21-3-1, they were 12-2 in the Big 8 3A where they finished second this year. The Tigers made their eighth appearance in an NCHSAA Men's Soccer Championship, earning their fifth state championship in school history.

4A Championship: Green Hope gets two from Durand and beats Myers Park 4-1 for fourth State Championship

RALEIGH – The Green Hope Falcons netted two second half goals, both by Sam Durand, and ran away to a 4-1 victory over Myers Park for their fourth men's soccer State Championship in school history.

In the early going, both teams had opportunities, but were unable to cash in. The Falcons saw a header by Josh Mohess sail wide off a corner kick in the 13th minute. Then in the 14th minute, Myers Park lofted a ball up to Daniel Watts in the center of the box. Watts coolly too the ball down off his chest and turn towards goal, ripping a shot right at the keeper which was held out to keep the game scoreless.

The Falcons broke the ice in the 20th minute as Daniel Cho ran onto a ball in the edge of the penalty area. With the keeper running on, Cho took a step right and slipped a pass just in front of the sprawling keeper to Dylan Enseling who slotted the ball in the net for the 1-0 lead.

Watts created another two chance for Myers Park in the 33rd minute as he rang a shot low off the left post, bouncing out to teammate Charles Pringle. Pringle's put back attempt was off the mark as well, and the Falcons held on to their 1-0 lead at the half.

Just two minutes into the second half, Sam Cooper shook his Mustang defender, splitting a pair of them into the box. He let loose a right-footed shot that was knocked away by the keeper, but fell right to Sam Durand. Durand chipped in the rebound for his first of two markers on the night and a 2-0 Green Hope lead.

Durand got his second of the night in the 51st minute after the Falcons worked some fantastical one and two-touch passes up the left side, eventually resting with Enseling about 45 yards from goal. Enseling picked out Alex Penel making a run towards the left side from mid-field, who then slipped a pass to Durand at the edge of the box. Durand slid the ball under the keeper in the left side of the net for a 3-0 lead. Durand was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Myers Park tried to claw back into the game with Daniel Watts picking up an unassisted goal in the 62nd minute to cut it to 3-1. However, the damage had been done with the Falcons three goals, and they added a fourth in the 73rd minute when Sam Cooper banged home a rebound chance following Daniel Cho's shot off the post.

Myers Park finished the year 20-3, 11-2 in the Southwestern 4A Conference where they finished second behind Porter Ridge. The Mustangs reached the State Championship for the seventh time in school history.

Green Hope wrapped up the year 23-2-1, champions of the Triangle 6 4A Conference where they held a 9-1 record. The Falcons reached the State Championship game for the sixth time in school history, earning the school's fourth championship. It was the first title for Green Hope in men's soccer since 2016 when they defeated Providence 3-0.



1A Championship: Bishop McGuinness takes first crown with a 2-0 decision over Franklin Academy

RALEIGH – Franklin Academy dominated the possession and game for the majority of the first half, but a 33rd minute counter-attack strike lifted Bishop McGuinness to a 1-0 lead and eventually their first Men's Soccer State Championship.

Franklin Academy had the Villains hemmed into their own end for most of the first 25 minutes, with Bishop McGuinness absorbing most of the pressure of the first half. Franklin Academy had a few chances, but not any that they could manage to put a shot on frame with any pace.

Ultimately it was a turnover and a transition moment that saw Cameron Bovender on the ball in the midfield. Bovender took a single dribble and threaded a ball to Brad Standen who poked it with his right foot around a defender and past the keeper for a 1-0 lead in the 33rd minute. Standen was named the game's M.V.P.

Bishop gained confidence with the 1-0 lead and looked more comfortable on the ball in the second half. Franklin Academy had a few desperate attempts and as the Patriots pushed more men forward, Nathan Joseph got on the ball deep in the Patriot end, 1-on-1 versus a final defender. Joseph won the footrace to the ball and into the box, tracking the ball down just before it ran out on the endline. He chipped a ball across the front of the net and after an initial save by the Patriots goal keeper, Alan Linares pounded it home for a 2-0 lead in the 78th minute.

Franklin Academy finished the season 23-1-1, they were 12-0 in the North Central 1A where they were the league champions. The Patriots won the Eastern Regional for the second time in school history.

Bishop McGuinness completed the year 19-2-3, 5-1 in the Northwest 1A. The Villains won their second all-time and second consecutive Western Regional Championship. They captured the school's first Men's Soccer State Championship.

2A Championship: Newton-Conover slips past First Flight 1-0 for third title

RALEIGH – In an exciting and hard-fought battle, it was Newton-Conover that got the lone goal to win the school's third State Championship in Men's Soccer in the school's history.

The two teams both showcased a very physical brand of soccer, each creating numerous chances throughout the game. First Flight peppered Newton-Conover keeper Jon Joplin all game, showering the sophomore with 15 shots, 11 of them on frame. Joplin stood firm, making all 11 required saves for the shutout.

The sparkling championship moment for the Red Devils came in the 58th minute as a clearance out of the Devil defense found the lone forward at the time, Francisco Tapia at midfield. Outnumbered 3-1, Tapia forced the issue, dribbling through the Nighthawk rear defenders and working the ball to his left foot. Tapia slotted a shot low and hard along the ground just to the left of the sprawling left foot of keeper Stryker Owens to give Newton-Conover a 1-0 lead.

Tapia's goal made him the match M.V.P. and was the lone goal surrendered by the emergency keeper for First Flight. Owens was tapped as the starter when First Flight's starting keeper, Lucas Neitherlander, sustained a hand injury during the pre-game warm-ups.

First Flight ended the season 21-2, with an 8-0 record in the Northeastern Coastal 2A where they were the champions of the league. They won the Eastern Regional for the second straight year and fourth time in school history.

Newton-Conover secured the school's third State Championship in Men's Soccer. The Red Devils season concluded with 27-0-2 with a perfect 14-0 record in the South Fork 2A. The Red Devils won the Western Regional title for the third time in school history and the first time since 2014.



3A Championship:

Chapel Hill gets a pair of second half goals to get by A.C. Reynolds 2-0

RALEIGH – Chapel Hill hasn't won a State Championship in Men's Soccer since 1983. The Tigers had an all-time record of 1-4 in their previous State Championship appearances, including a stinging 1-0 defeat by Marvin Ridge in last year's 3A State Final. This year's team, remembering that difficult defeat, finished the job with a 2-0 win over A.C. Reynolds.

The two teams battled to a scoreless stalemate at halftime, with neither side registering a shot on goal. A.C. Reynolds' Izaiah Vignali had the most dangerous scoring opportunity of the first half as he cracked a shot a foot or two over the bar from about 30 yards out.

Chapel Hill got going with an offensive foray into the box turning into a corner kick opportunity in the 62nd minute. Ryan Smith went to the corner and sent in a beautiful out-swinging cross that found Justin Mecham who knocked it through traffic into the back of the net for a 1-0 lead.

After some furious attempts by A.C. Reynolds, including a corner kick opportunity that saw Vignali take another crack from 20 yards out that was deflected out for another corner, Chapel Hill won a free kick deep in their own end with about two minutes to play. Mecham took the free kick and dropped a ball right on Smith in the edge of the penalty area from about 75 yards out and Smith one-touch volleyed the ball past the keeper to ice the Tiger victory.

A.C. Reynolds finished the season 23-3-2, they were 14-1-1 in the Western Mountain 3A where they were league champions. The Rockets won the Western Regional for the first time in school history and made their first State Championship game appearance.

Chapel Hill wrapped up the season 23-4-1, they were 12-1-1 as the champions of the Big 8 3A. The Tigers made the school's sixth appearance in an NCHSAA Men's Soccer State Championship game, winning the school's second title all-time.

4A Championship:

Cardinal Gibbons nips Hough 2-1 to win their first 4A title

RALEIGH – In a 4A State Championship match that featured a lot of firepower on both sides, It was a corner kick in the 45th minute that made the ultimate difference, lifting Cardinal Gibbons to a 2-1 lead and eventually the school's first 4A State Championship in Men's Soccer.

With the score tied at 1, Gibbons earned a corner kick on a deep probing run into the box. Sal Bottone stepped into the corner to deliver the corner kick, dropping a beautiful in-swinging ball onto the back post where it found the waiting head of Jackson Hollenbach. The senior midfielder Hollenbach directed it on frame and into the back of the net with a flick of his head in the 45th minute, giving the Crusaders the decisive 2-1 lead.

Hollenbach also played a role in the Crusaders first marker of the game, when the Crusaders won possession in the Hough penalty area, Hollenbach slipped a pass to Jack Zarnik from the edge of the box. Zarnik danced by two Huskies defenders and slipped the ball off his right foot into the back of the net, breaking the ice in the 24th minute. Hollenbach was named the game's M.V.P. with a goal and an assist.

Hough equalized the match just four minutes after the first Gibbons goal. Davis Ashbrook found Kyle Jeffrey who knocked home the goal that sent the match to halftime tied. Hough finished the season 24-2, they were 14-0 as champions of the I-Meck 4A Conference. Hough won their first Western Regional Final on their way to their first State Championship appearance.

Cardinal Gibbons concluded the season with a 23-0-2 record overall, they were 11-0-1 as the champions of the Cap 7 4A Conference. Gibbons appeared in their eighth state championship game in Men's Soccer, and won the school's sixth Men's Soccer State Championship in all classifications.

2016 1-A: Wallace-Rose Hill captures third state title, Espinoza breaks national record

RALEIGH, N.C. - Wallace-Rose Hill gave up the first goal in the 2016 1A State Championship Soccer Match, but the Bulldogs netted the next three to take a 3-1 victory over Bishop McGuinness. The victory was the Bulldogs third state championship in as many appearances.

Wallace-Rose Hill dominated play for much of the game with Jack Arnold making 4 saves in the first half to keep things level until teammate Cameron Bovender took a shot off a deflected clear that found the back of the net giving the Villains a 1-0 lead just 20 minutes in.

The Bulldogs kept the pressure high and the effort finally paid off in the 32nd minute as a corner kick pinballed around in the box, dropping to senior Lukas Heither who swept it past the keeper tying the score.

Six minutes later David Sosa finished a beautiful ball by Jorge Aguilar giving Wallace-Rose Hill a lead they did not relinquish.

The highlight of the match, and a career, came in the 47th minute. Bulldog senior forward Maynor Espinoza came into the State Championship Match sitting on 213 goals for his four-year career, tied for the NFHS National Record for career goals with Sean Shapert from Moon High School in Pennsylvania. Shapert held the record from 1984 when he set the mark until Espinoza spun a ball past the Villains keeper to give Wallace-Rose Hill a 3-1 lead and a 1A State Championship. Espinoza was named the match M.V.P.

2016 2-A: FIRST FLIGHT WINS FIRST TITLE WITH A 4-0 SHUTOUT OF CHASE

RALEIGH, N.C. – First Flight came in to the 2A Men's Soccer State Championship Match riding high off of a 3-1 win over Carrboro in the regional finals, they kept that momentum moving right through the Championship match. The Nighthawks netted a goal in the 7th minute as Quinn Douglas knocked home a rebound giving First Flight a 1-0 lead they would never relinquish on their way to the first Soccer State Championship in school history.

The Nighthawks' journey was not one without adversity. Just 15 minutes into the regional final against Carrboro, starting goal keeper Grayson Shier broke his clavicle, ending his season. Sophomore Wilmer Andino

stepped in to finish out the game against Carrboro, allowing just one goal in the 3-1 win, and securing a bid to the state finals. With Andino making his first Varsity start, the Nighthawks got out on the front foot early with Douglas goal and followed it up with another rebound goal, this one by Vega Sproul in the 27th minute, giving First Flight a 2-0 lead.

Game M.V.P. Tommy Scott added two second half markers to put the game out of reach. He scored off of a rebound in minute 44, and then broke into the box and slipped one under the diving Trojan goal keeper in the 59th minute to push the lead to 4-0. Andino was tested several times, making a single save in the first half to keep the game scoreless early. He made one other routine save, but late in the match, Chase earned a free kick at the corner edge of the 18-yard box. Luis Vasquez for the Trojans stepped up to take the kick and curled a ball off his right foot that looked ticketed for the upper-right corner of the goal before a diving Andino parried away for a corner, sealing his shut out and first clean sheet of his career.

Chase finished the season at 22-2, 15-1 in conference play as champions of the South Mountain Athletic 3A Conference. First Flight concluded year 12 for head coach Juan Ramirez with his first state championship and a 21-0-2 record.

2016 3-A: MARVIN RIDGE HOLDS OFF CHAPEL HILL 1-0 TO WIN 3A CROWN

RALEIGH, N.C. – A 39th minute penalty kick was the difference for Marvin Ridge as Brandon Young drove the ball into the upper-right corner of the net and lifted the Mavericks to the lead late in the first half. Young was named the game's M.V.P. as the lone goal scorer in the match. The Mavericks won their third championship in as many appearances in the State Championship Match.

Despite heavy pressure from Chapel Hill for much of first half, Marvin Ridge held the lead on some stellar goalkeeping by Tyler Fant. The Senior parried a bullet free kick just over the bar from just 30 yards out off the boot of Chapel Hill's Justin Mecham 20 minutes into the first half. Fant made two other spectacular saves in the first half, punching out a line shot and cleaning up a loose corner attempt.

The difference in the match was the final two minutes of the first half. After being on their heels and defen-

Just seven minutes later Green Hope was on the board again as Porter Ridge keeper Julio Rangel stopped the first shot attempt by Anthony Boswell, but he couldn't get to the rebound chance. Jacob Sciandra, a senior midfielder, followed the Boswell shot knocking the rebound just out of the reach of Rangel and gave the Falcons a 2-0 lead.

The final goal for the Falcons came in the 75th minute off a corner kick. Camden Holbrook took a left footed in-swinging corner and found the head of William Dugger who knocked it off the keeper and in the net making it 3-0. The Green Hope defense was impressive all night, the Falcon back four did not allowed only three shots on the night, only one of which was on target. Falcon Senior Zach Curtis anchored the defense and was named the game M.V.P. Porter Ridge was under siege most of the night, goal keeper Rangel was under fire, but did make 5 saves. The Falcons fired 16 shots on the night, nine of them were on frame.

Green Hope finished the year 28-1, 15-1 in the Southwest Wake 4A as the conference champions. Their lone loss of the season came 2-0 to rival Panther Creek.

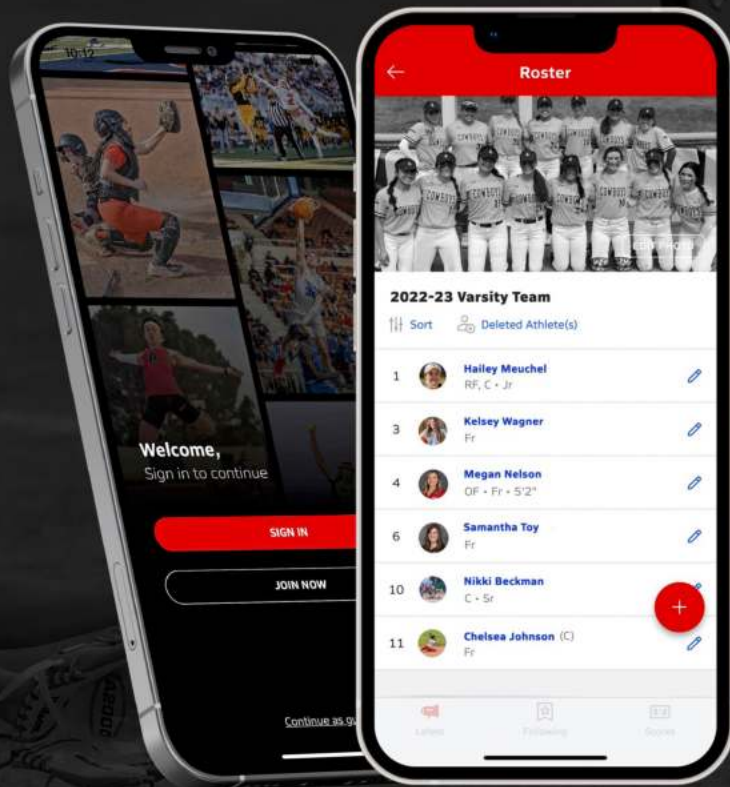
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
