



I am writing to recommend Luke Vail for the North Carolina High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame. Coach Vail had an outstanding teaching and coaching career in his thirty plus years at Charles B. Aycock High School in Pikeville. I have known Coach Vail since I started coaching women's tennis at Greene Central High School in the fall of 1988. Our relationship has evolved from arch nemesis to mentor to good friend. I am currently the women's tennis coach at Charles B. Aycock High School and speak with Coach Vail frequently.

Coach Vail was the first coach, and one of very few even today, to establish a dominant women's tennis program in eastern North Carolina. Coach Vail took over the women's tennis program in 1979 and won 28 consecutive conference championships (a state record for all sports that stood until 2022) and 305 consecutive conference matches. When he retired in 2013, only four state championships in women's tennis had been won by a school east of Raleigh, and Coach Vail's 1997 team won one of those four.

I gave a speech in January of 2003 at the annual USTA North Carolina Tennis Weekend Awards Banquet where Coach Vail was honored as the 2002 recipient of the Ron Lee High School Tennis Coach of the Year award. I started off the speech by talking about some of my accomplishments at the time. I mentioned that (at the time) my team had won nine consecutive conference championships and had not lost a conference match since 1993. My team had advanced to the state 2-A championship match five years in a row. I told the assembled crowd, though, that my proudest accomplishment up to that point was my 5-19 record against Luke Vail and Charles B. Aycock. Yes, you read that correctly. You see, as I told the crowd, that made me the winningest coach in eastern North Carolina against Luke Vail. No other public school team east of Raleigh had won more than one match against Coach Vail since 1979 when he started his career.

Coach Vail was certainly one of the top tennis coaches in North Carolina during his tenure at Charles B. Aycock High School, but I want to talk for a moment about Coach Vail as a mentor. I remember meeting Coach Vail for the first time in the fall of 1988. I was a new coach at Greene Central High School in nearby Snow Hill. Little did I know that one day our two schools would be the biggest women's tennis rivals in eastern North Carolina. At the time, I had just been hired to coach the tennis teams at Greene Central despite never having coached high school sports, a women's team, or a tennis team. My background was in Little League, Babe Ruth, and American Legion baseball. To say we had the worst team in America is probably an understatement. When I took over the program, the school had never had a winning season or won a conference championship or even won very many matches in a year. I continued the tradition, at least for a while, losing my first 32 matches as the head women's tennis coach at Greene Central. We won a doubleheader to close out the 1989 season and then we began to win a few matches a year from 1990 to 1993 and finally won a conference championship and had a winning season in 1994 (first in the school's history). Greene Central has since won 30 consecutive conference titles in women's tennis, a state record for all sports. Of course, we got slaughtered in 1988 and 1989, but in 1990 we started winning some games. I began to measure the quality of my program against Charles B. Aycock. Coach Vail was always willing to answer my questions about how to improve

my program over the years and we began to talk over the phone in the offseason. I remember him frequently telling me that it took a long time to build a program from scratch. I started implementing a lot of his suggestions in my practice sessions, and slowly (but surely) we began to show some improvement. We had the school's first winning season and won the school's first conference championship in 1994. Of course, we still lost 9-0 to Coach Vail's team, though. That first win finally came against C.B. Aycock late in the 1995 season. That 5-4 win late in the season in 1995 at C.B. Aycock remains today one of the most magical moments of my 46-year coaching career. My program at Greene Central continued to prosper. In 1998, we made our first of eight consecutive trips to the 2-A state championship match, and in 2005 we won a 2-A state championship. I don't think we ever lost a match to C.B. Aycock after I gave that speech in 2002, but Coach Vail remained my mentor until his retirement in 2013. Even today, we talk on the phone at least once a month.

In one of the great ironies of life, I became the women's tennis coach at Charles B. Aycock High School in the fall of 2022 (I retired from Greene Central in the spring of 2014). Coach Vail was one of the first people to contact me with congratulations. He frequently offers to come out and help with practice and has helped several times with infrastructure problems around the facility when no one else could seem to get anything done. He calls about once a month to find out how the program is progressing and still offers advice.

Coach Vail is a legend in eastern North Carolina coaching circles. He won 907 games and matches in men's tennis, women's tennis, and women's basketball during his storied career and lost only 253. He had a deep and abiding love for Charles B. Aycock High School. He taught AP United States History and AP United States History for thirty years at the school and coached three sports for much of his career. Guess where he was on most Friday nights? He was in the press box for home football games announcing for the Golden Falcons.

In closing, I give Luke Vail my absolute highest recommendation for the North Carolina High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame. He built a legendary program at Charles B. Aycock High School in a rural eastern North Carolina county without the help of expensive country clubs and high-priced teaching professionals providing him with a steady stream of great players year in and year out. His teams were determined, gritty, and never quit (emulating the personality of their coach).

I am pleased to nominate Coach Steve Spivey for the North Carolina High School Athletic Hall of Fame.

I played for Coach Spivey during my four years at Broughton High School, from 1986 to 1990. Under his leadership, our team won three state titles, and I secured two individual singles titles. These achievements were driven by Coach Spivey's dedication to excellence and his ability to adapt his approach to each player's strengths and areas for improvement. He knew when to "tweak" the formula to maximize his team's potential.

Coach Spivey started coaching the women's team around my junior year and soon achieved similar success. Over the years, he accumulated many titles at Broughton and beyond, establishing a remarkable winning record. When he left Broughton, his record stood at 921-73, the highest in any sport. He later coached in South Carolina, winning another state title, before returning to Raleigh to coach at Enloe High School, where he led both the men's and women's teams to state titles.
